- 1. Friedmann writes, "All effective planning is, therefore, a negotiated process among affected parties who have different values, concerns, and interests at stake." Do you agree? How ought groups to gain standing in this negotiation?
- 2. Friedmann lists six skills unique to planners? Do you agree? All told, the skills he lists seem to define planners (you!) as implementation specialists." Do you buy that?
- 3. Friedmann writes that planning involves "a struggle for a change in the political configuration, for a change in the rules that govern the game, for new understandings and reinterpretations of familiar shibboliths." Do you agree?
- 4. What does Friedmann mean by moral discourse or praxis?
